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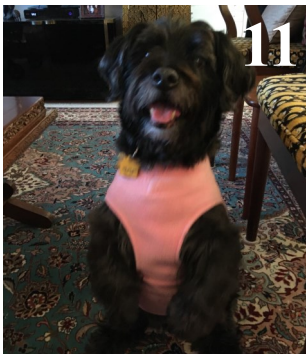

I hope that July 2020 finds you healthy and adjusted to the “new way of life at Watergate at Landmark (WAL)!” The COVID-19 pandemic has certainly thrown a huge curve to life as we knew it. On behalf of the Board of Directors, I want to say thank you to all of our residents for their part in keeping WAL a safe and healthy place for

us to live. Your diligence and patience are appreciated, especially with the on-going infrastructure projects. The “stay-at-home” orders may have inconvenienced you but the end results will create a “better place” for us to live!

Phase Two at and How it Affects You!

Phase Two of Governor Northam’s Forward Virginia plan, also known as “Safer at Home,” began on June 12. A Special BOD Meeting was held on June 9, 2020, featuring an overview of the amenities and facilities reopening process at WAL. As a result, amenities in our community reopened and Handyman Service resumed operations. Each amenity has signs posted as you enter these locations with the “specific details and safety instructions” our community must abide by. For instance, there are reduced capacity numbers for each amenity and face-covering requirements.

These required modifications were made to operate our activities and facilities on a daily basis. Updates to these requirements will be done as needed. More signs will be posted to inform you about scheduled closures throughout the day to clean and disinfect high-contact areas. Seating areas have been reconfigured to comply with social distancing guidelines. Please do not move chairs, tables, umbrellas, chaise lounges, etc.

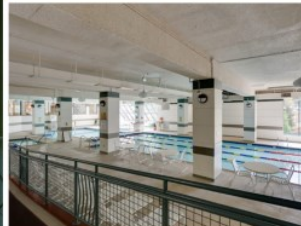

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HOW'S YOUR RENOVATION PROJECT GOING?

You're probably excited about the potential of renovating your bathroom, kitchen or living space. However, there's one *simple, yet important*, question you should ask before starting the project.

Do I need to get Association Approval for this before my contractors or I begin renovating?

So glad you asked. Certain items, particularly those involving (but not exclusive to) electrical and water-related issues, must receive preapproval from the Association prior to the start date of your project. When in doubt, act on the assumption that you need approval.

Renovation Process

Visit or call Resident Services and speak with Office Manager Margaret Nestor. She will assist you with the renovation process so that your updates are within the Associations' Rules and Regulations (R&R) as well as any applicable city, state and federal laws. Residents should submit a *Renovation & Architectural Modification Request* form if they want to do a major renovation or anything requiring a permit. Copies may be picked up from Resident Services or downloaded from the Other Helpful Documents Page at: www.watergateatlandmark.com.

Bring the completed form to Resident Services in order to begin the application process. Should a resident desire to

speed up the process or request a decision to be made prior to the Covenants Committee meeting, they must pay a \$50 short-notice fee per the FY2020 Fee Schedule. Be sure to include the following when completing the form:



Renovations done well help maintain your property value and create the oasis of your dreams.

- Proposed changes to the floor plan
- Proposed renovation area photos
- Copy of Contractor's License with a RBC (Residential Building), a CBC (Commercial Building) or a CIC (Commercial Improvement Contractor) designation
 - Applications will be denied if this is excluded from the application without exception.

Also, depending on the scope of the project, you may need to submit:

- Copies of construction, electrical and/or plumbing permits
- Diagram of any proposed changes to the wiring system
- An electrical load statement addressing the impact of such changes
- Diagram of proposed changes to the plumbing infrastructure.
- Floor plan with measurements that show the removal, addition or rearrangement of walls and/or doors

Once all documents have been received, Management verifies the contractor's license, certifies all applicable permits were obtained and reviews plans to ensure structural integrity for the proposed plans are feasible for the unit type and location. The Covenants Committee votes to approve or reject the proposal. The approved applications are then ratified at its monthly meeting. Decisions are mailed via USPS to the applicant.

Skipping the Process

Work done without Association approval may result in a \$150 fee per the FY2020 Fee Schedule. This does not include extra expenses you may be liable for if repair work is needed to fix issues caused by your renovation.

Does Everything Have to Be Approved?

For some renovation work, unit owners and/or contractors do not need Association approval. You still need to notify Patrol Services prior to anyone coming on the property to perform work. Be ready to give the name of the contractor and describe the scope of work to be completed.

WAL's R&R state the following renovations or alterations don't require an application to the Association or a contractor with the appropriate licenses:

- Painting or wallpapering
- Decorating your unit per the Association's Declaration
- Installing new closet shelving
- Replacing the same or similar type of the following:
 - Flooring (e.g. carpet for carpet, vinyl for vinyl)
 - Appliances located in the same location as existing ones
 - Plumbing fixtures
 - Window coverings
 - Light fixtures, outlets, thermostats and switches

If you still aren't sure, please confirm with the Association that your renovations or updates don't need preapproval. Failing to do so puts you at risk of having after-the-fact assessments levied against you and footing the bill for extensive damage caused by your renovation.

Finally, notify Patrol Services in advance about contractors or delivery persons coming to your unit for both pre-approved and exempted renovations. This eliminates delays at the Front Gate. Contractors (to include subcontractors,

painters, plumbers and other building trades) may come on property Monday—Saturday from 8 a.m.—6 p.m. unless it is an emergency repair. Please plan accordingly, as hammering, sawing, power tools, or other activity that may generate noise audible in other units by a contractor are strictly forbidden on Saturdays.

Enjoy the reward of your newly updated space once you've gone through WAL's renovation process!

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ACTIVISTS ARISING: WHY THEIR LIVES MATTER

May 25, 2020 was the day taking a knee caused a nation to stand against systemic racism and the lack of accountability for the disproportionate deaths of Black people during police encounters.

Following the death of George Floyd in Minnesota, thousands flocked to the nation’s capital and their respective cities to show their angst about his treatment while detained by police. A’Nyah Wells, a 20-year-old psychology major, Anisa, an 18-year-old high school graduate who’s Air Force-bound, and Naomi McDonald, a 20-year-old communications major, were some of them. These WAL residents attended several protests locally and were willing to share their stories and experiences.

Why now?

A’Nyah: I saw it [the video] on Twitter and was like almost numb to it. It’s another one of *these* videos...people watch video after video...Philando Castile, Sandra Bland, Tamir Rice...so many others. And the world’s like it’s just another Black man. It’s ridiculous. What if it was you? Or your brother, uncle, cousin who ever? How would you feel? I mean life here at Watergate isn’t bad at all. I grew up here. But you can’t forget that there’s a world outside of WAL. It’s not political but [basic] human rights that we’re fighting for.

Anisa: When I saw the video, it was heart-breaking...it’s crazy that who you fear [are] the ones here to protect you. I don’t really like to be out front but I can stand and sup-

port what’s right. Here, at least there’s no reason to be afraid.

Naomi: I think that just after George Floyd, it was like enough is enough. We have been fighting way too long. It has to stop with my generation. That’s why my peers [and I] are taking a stand. We have to make a bigger change than what’s been done...Some say, “Y’all are just getting mad and angry.” No! We feel the effects of what’s happened in the past TO THIS DAY! Black Lives Matter

(BLM) it sounds simple, but it means we just want (equal) rights. Black lives never mattered. Black lives have never been a part of the “All Lives Matter” in the U.S. It may not mean a lot to some but it means a hell of a lot to me, to my peers and to my future kids. So if this movement brings about change then it’s worth it.

A’Nyah: My friends who aren’t Black also support us [doing the protests]. We’re doing this for a good reason. I’ve always been the one to question the status quo and ask why things were like this for Black and Brown people. I

got the information from Instagram and Twitter, made signs for the event and got ready [for the protest].

What were the protests like?

A’Nyah: It was the most emotion I [have] *ever* felt. There were people of all backgrounds shouting ‘No Justice, No Peace.’ I felt really warm inside.

Anisa: I was crying [a little]. We did not encounter any violence or witness any looting. In the protest at Old Town, we had a police escort. I was nervous at first but nothing happened. They walked along with us.

Naomi: [The DC protests were] pretty cool. Seeing a lot of the “allies”—anyone that’s not Black—that stood along with us and spoke up for the cause gives me a little more hope. At least we’re not the only ones seeing this. I can be proud of this that people are more willing and open to stand with us even if it’s still a fight.

The protests I’ve attended were very peaceful. I’ve seen some instigators who tried to get a rise out of people, but no one took [the bait].

What do you see as the goal for these protests?

Naomi: I think for today, in the era of technology, I think that people are going to be more brave to speak out and be more aware. People will call out [prejudice] more.

A’Nyah: I just hope that everybody is treated equally...where justice is a real thing. I mean, this is America where we’re supposed to be able have life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness right? I don’t know if I’ll see it happen in my lifetime but I hope so.

Naomi: Awareness would be the biggest thing. We’re having the conversations now, the conversation that makes people feel uncomfortable...and we’re not backing down.

A’Nyah: I don’t have hate in my heart. I don’t hate anybody. Hating people based on race, gender, nationality or anything is wrong. I hope people take the time to educate themselves on slavery and see how it is still around in modern times. If you see someone hurting, do what you can. It’s really no cost to you to say something when it’s the right thing.

How has this moment in history affected you and your view on the world and your life’s purpose?

Anisa: A year ago, I wasn’t going to vote. I was one of those people who didn’t think your vote counted. Now *this* happened. It’s a voting trip now and I’m taking people with me. I feel like I have some type of say.

A’Nyah: We can’t keep protesting forever. It’s not sustainable. So what else do we need to do? Go to the local meetings. Anyone that supports racial equality and our best interests that’s who we have to support. I want to cre-

ate jobs for those who’ve been [incarcerated]. I support businesses that align with the movement. As I see the change occurring all over, it’s important that we [don’t] act like our voice doesn’t matter because it does.

Anisa: I’m about to join the military. That’s a serious thing. I want to work on the system and not sit back. I hope [this moment] changes the way we are policed and the way they see us.

Naomi: I’m still figuring things out right now. But I want to be a content creator. Somehow I want to use what I’m learning to make a difference.

The coronavirus has changed life as we knew it and the Fourth of July celebrations are no exception. While several localities already cancelled their celebrations for the day, some—like the nation’s capital and Alexandria—are trekking forward with a few modifications of course.

Virginia

City of Alexandria

The City plans to host a virtual birthday party for USA/Alexandria Birthday Celebration on Saturday, July 11. No other details were released prior to the printing deadline. For updates, visit <http://apps.alexandriava.gov/Calendar/Detail.aspx?si=29533>.

Mount Vernon

You might catch a glimpse of the first President of the United States, George Washington, should you venture out to the historic estate. In addition to a presidential visit, visitors can enjoy the Red, White and Blue Concert that features the National Concert Band and a wreath-laying ceremony. Some portions of the event are most likely cancelled such as the daytime fireworks and naturalization ceremony.

The event requires attendees 10 years and older to wear a face covering while entering buildings. Visitors will not be mandated to wear masks in the outside areas of the estate as long as they are social distancing and are comfortable without a mask according to a Mount Vernon representative. The event will occur rain or shine, so plan ahead and enjoy!

Washington, DC Celebration

The Capitol Hill Community 4th of July Parade will still happen although not on its usual route on 8th Street. Instead, organizers plan to create a virtual parade for viewers to enjoy! For details, visit <https://www.capitolhill4thparade.com/>. This parade is different from the nationally-broadcasted parade co-hosted by the

National Park Service. According to the event’s [website](#), The National Independence Day Parade cancelled its participation in the 2020 celebration for July 4.

The Salute to America event will occur at White House on the South Lawn and Ellipse on Saturday, July 4, with the start time pending at the time of publication. Music, flyovers and military recognition will be followed by an address from the President. Once his address concludes, a fireworks display on the National Mall will conclude the evening’s events.



Fun’s still to be had on July 4!

PBS will broadcast its annual concert *A Capitol Fourth* on Saturday, July 4, from 8 – 9:30 p.m. The 40-year-old tradition features performances from several musical guests across multiple genres and it’s traditionally followed by fireworks.

Rooftop Observation Deck

Even if you plan to stay at WAL, there are a few things to keep in mind. You might be able to catch a glimpse of the DC fireworks from the rooftop of Bldg. 1 or Bldg. 2 if you have a *Rooftop Observation Decks*

User Authorization waiver on file at Resident Services. Residents who completed the form ahead of time will receive permissions via their fob access to enter the Rooftop Observation Deck. The COVID-19-related restrictions and Rules and Regulations for the rooftop use still apply. Those who are 9-years-old or younger should be in the care of a responsible person per the City’s childcare guidelines. Access to one or both Rooftop Observation Decks may be restricted by Management at any time due to current weather conditions, maintenance or repair needs or other factors deemed critical to the Association. These restrictions take precedence over open-access hours so plan accordingly.

Gazebos

You might also want to rent a gazebo or party room for a small gathering with loved ones. Plan ahead as all offices will close on July 4 and the hours vary for July 3. Print a form from the Other Helpful Documents section of the website’s Residents tab.

Plug in your electric grill or use one of the picnic areas for lunch or dinner. Follow local laws and community rules and regulations regarding these common spaces to keep your event in compliance and to reduce the chances of spreading COVID-19.

Bought Some Fireworks?

The City of Alexandria prohibits fireworks of any kind. The City’s [website](#) states that “it is unlawful for anyone to store, offer for sale, expose for sale, sell at retail, use or explode any fireworks (including sparklers) within the City limits.” This goes for all residents as well as those visiting or working in City. The Fire Marshal will confiscate all fireworks found in your possession if caught. These offenses are Class One misdemeanors and may result in a \$2,500 fine and/or up to 12 months in prison.

WHEN BIRDS “ATTACK”

Have you ever had a bird swoop or dive-bomb you here at WAL?

Several residents reported that they've encountered seemingly aggressive birds who've traded their sweet chirping for diving and swooping at them as they're walking around WAL! So far, residents report that the dive-bombs occurred on the Upper Terrace near the parking lot, in the circle area near the back gate and between the Tennis Courts and Building Two.

Please try not to take it personal though, as the [U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service \(FWS\)](#) says it is natural scare tactic some birds use to protect their young from harm's way. Mockingbirds in particular are very

protective and exhibit this behavior throughout their nesting season from January – August according to FWS. Swallows and some raptors are also known to guard their young this way.

What can you do?

The FWS recommends using your open umbrella to protect you in the areas where these birds are nesting

or avoid the areas altogether. Active nests with bird eggs or chicks can't be removed without a permit from the FWS and irrefutable evidence of its health and safety hazard to birds or humans. Empty, inactive nests do not require a permit for removal.

So get your umbrellas out, travel through the tunnels, take the scenic route or watch out for those birds!

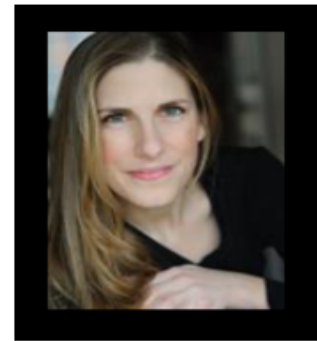
