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

Face Coverings: Don't Leave Home Without It!

New this month is the requirement to wear a mask outside within the city limits of Alexandria. The Alexandria City Council voted to expand Governor Northam's mask order to include outside spaces. Until further notice, you must wear a mask whenever you are not in your car or personal residence. Here at WAL, everyone must wear a mask in all outdoor spaces. There are exceptions for physical activities, medical conditions and active eating. Please acquaint yourself with this new city ordinance #5293. As Mayor Wilson said during the discussion before the ordinance passed, "The safest thing is for people to be socially distanced from folks and not be in situations where you're in

MASKS ARE REQUIRED IN PUBLIC

close contact with folks who could transmit the virus to you but if that's not possible have a mask [on].

Association Contracts

The Association renegotiated the shuttle bus contract. The new contract is for a 3-year period starting this month. For FY 2021, costs are \$216,300 per year vs. \$235,932 for FY 2020. There is no reduction in schedule for the daily shuttle to and from the Metro. However, there are fewer shopping trips per week due to reduced ridership. Also, excursion day trips will now be billed at \$70 per hour used whereas before the Association wasn't previously charged.

Do You Have an HO-6 Insurance Policy?

October is good time to review your homeowner's insurance policy. This month, the Association renewed our master insurance policy. Travelers Insurance Company remains our property coverage insurance company and our premium increased from \$253,439 in FY 2020 to \$296,888 in FY 2021. The deductible remains at \$10,000. This Association master policy ensures that the building and common areas are covered, but you will need your own condo insurance policy to protect your unit and personal belongings. Individual condominium insurance covers what your association policy doesn't, like repairing the inside of your unit after disasters, repairing damage, events caused by you in other units, replacing damaged or stolen belongings and paying liability costs if guests are injured in your condo. Insurance carriers describe an owner's personal condo insurance policy as HO-6 insurance. I encourage you to acquaint yourself with our master policy as well as contact

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your insurance agent to determine how your HO-6 coverage and our master insurance policy work in tandem.

FY 2021 Budget

The budget for major projects is limited for FY 2021. Expect to see these major projects this fiscal year:

- Bldg. 1 HVAC Fascia finished
- HVAC Fascia project begins for Bldg. 3
- Balcony Repairs for Bldg. 4
- Elevator Motor Replacement in Bldg. 4. Either Bldg. 2 or 3 will receive new motors next per an evaluation by the contractor servicing our elevators.

Committee Events Amid COVID-19

During the August Board Meeting, the Board discussed social activities during COVID-19. The Board reinforced the Governor's Executive Orders regarding conditions for holding indoor and outdoor events at WAL. Committees were reminded that all proposed events must receive Board approval in sufficient time for advertising and planning. Examples of events that comply with the orders include the virtual magic show and outdoor concert planned and submitted to the Board by the Social Committee.

I look forward to having you attend our next virtual board meeting on Tuesday, October 27. Remember, wear a mask inside public spaces and outside. It could save a life.

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MAKING A DIFFERENCE

A VOLUNTEER ADVISOR TO THE WORLD'S LARGEST MUSEUM LIVES AT WAL

If you could make a difference in any area of someone else's life, what would you do? For, Candice Jordan, a 10-year Bldg.1 resident, she volunteers as an accessibility adviser to the Access Smithsonian program. Following is an interview about how and why she became involved with the "world's largest museum, education, and research complex" according to the Smithsonian's About Us page.

How did you connect with Access Smithsonian?

I moved to DC from Ohio in 2007 and attended a local event. I'm not sure how it all came together since it's been a while. However, I expressed interest in wanting to participate after hearing about the office and its goals.

I've loved the Smithsonian since my family visited DC when I was 11. I was so fascinated with the exhibits and learning new things, I'd get lost. My dad shared my love of museums too. I remember on my trip I told my parents that I was going to live in DC when I grew up. They did not believe this, but my Grandma did. She [told my parents], "You're losing that one, she's going to move away."

Yeah, I'm totally a museum rat and I absolutely love the Smithsonian. Two of my favorite loves together accessibility and museums. I mean, what can possibly be better?

Please talk about your role with Access Smithsonian.

Well, I participate in focus groups and provide feedback on the accessibility of exhibit items. Based on the recommendations received from the various focus groups, the exhibit staff decides what and how items are to be included in the exhibitions.

Why does accessibility at the Smithsonian matter?

It's important to give people as many options as to how they want to interact with the exhibits whether it's due to a disability or learning style. Being a person who is blind, I focus on tactile experiences. That's important to maintain amid COVID for people with a variety of disabilities.

Tell how your museum experience changed.

So many ways but I'll tell you one. I would typically have a docent read things to me at the museum. One time, I had my 9-year-old niece read the exhibit labels for me. It was hard understanding everything because sometimes she wouldn't know a word or understand a phrase. Once Aira, a program/service that helps describe for its users what is in the environment, was provided for free at the Smithsonian, [my niece and I] could go to the museum and I could point things out to her. I find that sharing information with others makes the [museum] visits more meaningful.

It must be awesome to be that close to the process.

It's a privilege to participate on that level. Making sure everyone who wants to visit the museum can visit the museum and have meaningful experiences is dear to my heart.

To be a part of this organization must mean a lot.

Absolutely. I lost my vision while in college at 21 years old. It was a really hard adjustment. But you have to take the cards that life deals you. I learned the skills that I needed to be independent and got support from my rehab counselor. The theme of my life has always been, "I can do it myself!" That's what drives me each day. Through both my work as a Vocational Rehabilitation Counselor or my home health and wellness businesses, I help people earn income and become independent. I am always willing and eager to share opportunities with others.

VOTING 2020

The 2020 General Election will be on **Tuesday, November 3**. Voters will cast votes for President (three candidates), U.S. Senate (two candidates), U.S. House of Representatives (two candidates for the 8th District), and two state constitutional amendments. Each contest has a write-in option.

Who Can Vote?

Eligible U.S. citizens who will be 18 years old by Election Day (November 3) may register to vote until Tuesday, October 13. Submit your application, update your voter registration information and confirm your registration at <https://vote.elections.virginia.gov>.

Ballot Drop Boxes

This year, ballot drop boxes will be available on the dates, times and locations posted on the Voting Registrar's website for in-person, early voting. They will also be stationed at all regu-

lar polling places on Election Day from 6 a.m. - 7 p.m. At the time of printing, the Voter's Registration Office is deciding when to add a secure outdoor drop box in front of its office. It will be under video surveillance and accessible to voters 24/7.

Absentee by Mail

three of the fillable absentee form to the Voter Registration Office at 132 N. Royal Street. To request a paper application, call 703-746-4050. The deadline to request an absentee ballot by mail for the November 3 election is

Friday, October 23. Ballots must be received at the Voter Registration Office before 7 p.m. on Election Day.

In-Person Absentee Voting

Regular hours for in-person absentee voting are Monday – Friday from 8 a.m. – 5 p.m. at the Voter Registration Office. There will be evening, weekday and Saturday hours starting Saturday, October 3. Beatley Library's in-person voting starts Friday, October 23. The deadline to vote in-person absentee is Saturday, October 31 by 5 p.m.

Election Day for WAL Residents

WAL residents vote at South Port Apartments, 6112 Edsall Road, and the shuttle bus will take residents to/from the polling place on Tuesday, November 3 after the regular morning rush-hour run. Please wear a mask per the city's ordinance requiring such in public.

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WELCOME TO LANDMARK OVERLOOK?

And, farewell to Big Lots, Alley Cat, and Dunya Restaurant and Banquet Hall. Hekemian and Company, a New Jersey-based real estate developer, has proposed redevelopment of the hilltop bounded by South Walker Street, South Whiting Street, Stevenson Avenue and Duke Street.

This proposal is in its conceptual phase and would contain two multi-family apartment buildings containing 376 units, two hotels with a total of 360 rooms and stacked condominiums consisting of 88 units. The stacked condominiums would be bounded by Stevenson Avenue, South Walker Street, and Duke Street. The two hotels would be bounded by Duke Street to the west and South Walker Street to the east, facing the Mini-Cooper dealership. The proposed development would

also contain two small community parks.

What happens next? The developer has presented this proposal to the Eisenhower West Landmark Van Dorn Implementation Advisory Group. The Advisory Group will solicit community input and present its recommendations to the City Council. Watergate at Landmark will provide its

input to the Advisory Group as the proposal progresses.

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
